

One-page Write Up Format

- Times New Roman, 12 point, double-spaced, 1-inch margins
- Length: >~1 page

Introduction (*Introduce yourself by first and last name, welcome the audience to your presentation*)

Research Question: (*Share your research question, tell a little about why you selected this question, or how you came to it. Do you have a life story that brought you to this question? Show excitement for your topic as if it is the coolest thing in the world as it should be*)

Thesis Claim: (*Tell your audience what you found after your research. In essence, you are giving your audience the answer to your research question*)

Evidence one “quote the evidence” (cite the evidence)

What does evidence mean? **What is evidence saying?** **What is the context?**

What background does the audience need to know, or understand?

What does the author want you to learn?

Why is evidence significant? **Why does evidence answer your question?**

Why do you feel the evidence is crucial?

How does evidence answer your question? **How is your evidence important?**

How is evidence connected to society or larger world?

Evidence two “quote the evidence” (cite the evidence)

Repeat

Evidence three “quote the evidence” (cite the evidence)

Repeat

Conclusion (*restate your findings and your research question, tell the reader what you want them to do starting today! Ask if there are any questions.*)

Works Cited

(*Include the citation for all evidence, double spaced, hanging indent, alphabetized, this page is its own page, e.g., if you have a 1.5 page write-up, you will have a third page with only the works cited.*)

Visual Presentation Format

- Images, photos, illustrations, graphs, charts to add “sights” to your words
- DO NOT put all of your text in your presentation
- Include headings, or parts of evidence, or just the key ideas so your viewer can track your presentation while you give it
- Include Research Question, Thesis Claim, Your Name
- Consider a minimum of the following slides to match your presentation:
 - Your name
 - Your question
 - Your first, second, third evidence
 - Your thesis, outcome, final thought
 - Your advice for the audience given your findings
